Using the pictures from around the poem below or draw your own, cut them out and place them in a bag, bowl or just a pile. Choose one picture, write down as many rhyming words as you can.</p>	<p> Onomatopoeia Read- The Sound collector again and identify all the onomatopoeia words (words that are sounds)</p> <p>Do you notice anything about all of the onomatopoeia words you have found? What do they all end with?</p> <p>Take a moment and listen to the sounds you can hear around you, what words would you use to describe them?</p> <p>Game- What made that sound? You can play this game with as many people as you like or just 2 of you. Each person takes it in turns to say a sound, the other person</p>	<p>During the poem The Sound Collector where do you think the sounds were being collected from?</p> <p>Today I want you to think about the sounds you can hear either inside your home or in your garden. </p> <p>Fill in the sheet below or write it out yourself, with 4 sounds and the objects they came from. You can draw pictures when you have finished for each one.</p> <p>I would like you to create a silly verse with the sounds and objects you have chosen.</p> <p>This is my silly verse from the noises in my house.</p>	<p> Comprehension- Use the poem to help you answer these questions.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Who is the sound collector? 2. Where did the sound collector put the sounds? 3. What time of day did the sound collector call? 4. What colour clothes is the sound collector wearing? <p>Create a picture or a model of The Sound Collector. Or dress up like the sound collector and take a photo.</p>	<p>Think about what sounds you hear around school. In the hall we might hear, chewing, crunching, stomping, banging, clanging. In the classroom we might hear, laughing, chatting, shouting, flicking pages of books, scratching pencils, scraping chairs across the floor. How about the noises in the ICT suite or the toilets?</p> <p>Make a list of all these sounds like mine above. Think about where you hear these sounds?</p> <p>Your final task is to create a minimum of 3 verses about the sounds we hear at school and where we hear them.</p>
